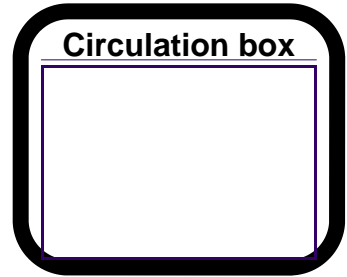

20:20 Hindsight A look back over 20 years of WACA

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It was Martin Luther King Jr who on 28 August 1963 proclaimed "I have a dream". Many of us have dreams. Share them with other like minded people and dreams become visions and then reality. Margaret Lorek had a dream - of an organisation to sit between the statutory and voluntary sectors in the Winchester area. She shared it with Margaret Gunn, Revd. Sir John Alleyne, Beth Taylor, Ena Bryan and others and they began to work towards achieving their vision. The organisation would harness the resources of the former, and the commitment and dedication of the latter, to enhance the quality of life of all in the Winchester area, but particularly those with some form of disability or disadvantage.

The reality became Winchester District Council of Community Service (WDCCS), founded in November 1988. The first, inspired, decision was to appoint Alison Way as General Secretary. In January 1989 Alison found herself, with an office in a dilapidated Nissen hut in Parchment Street, leading an organisation of one.

The hut was already home to an Age Concern lunch club, Winchester Group for Disabled People, to ballet and tap dancing classes and to a Spiritual Healing Group. Alison occupied one small office, but the vision of WDCCS began to catch the imagination of others, and the work grew. In June 1989 Liz Watts answered an advertisement for an administrator and financial assistant, and then there were two.

WDCCS grew to fill "The Winchester Centre" as it was known. Other offices began to be occupied – by Winchester Volunteer Bureau, the Community Care Liaison Worker, the Advocacy project, Dial-a-Ride, and The Princess Royal Trust for Carers. Among the familiar faces to join WDCCS were Jackie Lea and Jenny Meadows. The budget grew too, to exceed £1 million by the late 1990s.

The Nissen hut became a focus for many in the community during these early years. Eventually the demand for space in the Centre was such that Alison had to move her office into the cleaner's room. The hut was nearing the end of its working life but Margaret Lorek's dream had become such a successful reality that plans were put in hand for a new Winchester Centre. Various options were considered.

Finally in early 1996 the move was made – to the refurbished Casson Building in St. George's Street – the 'Winchester Centre' we have today. In addition to all of the occupants of the Parchment Street site, WDCCS was joined in the new accommodation by CAB and Relate – finally achieving another of that early visionary group's aspirations; to bring all of the mainstream Winchester voluntary sector organisations under one roof. Sadly Alison and Margaret Lorek are no longer with us, but their legacy remains – a dream become real.

WDCCS changed its name in 1999 to become Winchester Area Community Action.

Fitter Finance

Does your organisation need support to improve financial management, accounting and budgeting?

The Hampshire Voluntary Sector Consortium Fitter Finance Project funded by Capacitybuilders has launched an easy-to-use online 'community accountancy' toolkit for front-line groups and Community Development Workers.

Based on the needs of front-line groups in Hampshire, the toolkit provides a simple and easily understandable explanation of the basic principles needed to manage the financial aspects of a voluntary and community organisation.

It includes a glossary of specialist terms and an appendix of blank spreadsheets that can be downloaded and used, including a simple Petty Cash book and a tool that will enable you to measure funds against budgets. A hard copy of the toolkit will also be available soon.

WACA AGM



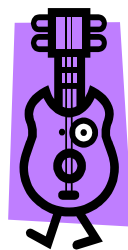

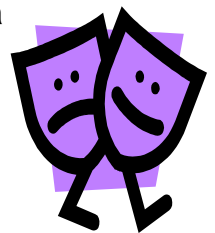
'Just Us'

High quality care for all: NHS Next Stage Review Final Report

Coinciding with the 60th NHS anniversary celebrations, Lord Darzi has published his final report on the NHS, billed as a once-in-a-generation review. including *Our vision for primary and community care*, and a draft NHS Constitution now out for consultation until 17 October 2008.

Both reports are important for the VCS because of what they have to say about partnership working, social enterprise, personal health budgets and the increasing role for practice-based commissioning. In addition, all healthcare providers should be aware that all registered healthcare providers working for, or on behalf of, the NHS will be required by law to publish Quality Accounts from 2010. They will also be required to take account of the NHS Constitution in their decisions and actions.

Carers at the heart of 21st century families and communities

The national carers' strategy has now been published. It sets out the government's short-term agenda and long-term vision for the future care and support of carers and is underpinned by £255m to implement some immediate steps alongside with medium and long-term plans. New commitments include: £150m additional funding over the next two years for respite care – this money will be made available from the NHS; £38m towards supporting carers to enter or re-enter the job market and £6m towards improving support for young carers. Youth Crime Action Plan

£100m is to be invested in an effort to stop young people from starting lives of crime. The action plan is a targeted effort to stop those under 18 from committing crimes, and calls for cross-governmental work to:

- provide intensive support for troubled families
- levy tougher, more visible community payback
- sentence for young people convicted of crime
- reducing youth crime is at the heart of the plan.
